Beach Bimmering, 2025 Edition



In a few short weeks all those families in soccer mom vans and ever larger SUVs will attempt to swamp the island. Blessedly, we will be home by then.

We had 23 hearty souls fire up an array of BMWs and head for one of the nicest places on earth, the Atlantis Lodge. Owned by the same family since 1959, they graciously welcome us each year for a chance to walk on the beach, bask in the sun, and glow in the shared warmth of the fire pit. It's magic.

We came from all across the Old North State with some of our number joining from as far away as Charlotte and Hickory. Old friends meeting new ones while experiencing the glories of fresh seafood and Caribbean salsa, mixed in with local favorites like Hush Puppies and BBQ. Always best to start with an overwhelming culinary experience at the Crab's Claw which is only a mollusk toss from the surf.



The Bimmers covered a wide array of the products from Munich, including an array of X3's and X5's, a collection of 3-series sedans, a Z4M convertible, and a Clown Shoe (Z3M Coupe) which always draws a crowd. The owner of the Atlantis Lodge, who owns an X3M40 himself, sought us out after we landed to

welcome us for our annual retreat from the rush of suburban life and back into the restive gaze of the local pelicans and sea gulls.

Once we checked in, we had the chance to dig toes into the sand, explore the property again, and start planning our next meal. In a world that sometimes seems to be moving too fast, this is the perfect place to downshift hard and sample some of life's simple pleasures. Salt air. The sound of rolling surf. The pleasant embrace of an expensive Cabernet. OK, clearly some things should never be left to chance.

The first evening took advantage of the "Community Room", a large meeting space graced with tables for four, a small kitchen, a pool table and ping pong. Also, a large TV, which we used to stream a fireplace video in HD. Perfect way to enjoy some snacks, story swapping, and detail plans for the next day's adventures.



For these trips we create an array of local sites to visit as the preferences of each driver / navigator team. Rather than going as a group, everyone gets to organize their own days with specific points where we reconnect as a group to kick tires and tell stories. There are local historic sites to see, including Fort Macon, a pre-Civil War construction designed to keep the Royal Navy at bay. There are multiple microbreweries and distilleries to be sampled.

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There's shopping to be enjoyed, and cruises on the Core and Back Sounds to see both wildlife and the wonders of the North Carolina Outer Banks.

A number of the BMW faithful set sail for Shackleford Bank, a spot which includes an amazing herd of wild horses. These beautiful equine examples have enjoyed living in the wild for centuries. As the locals report it, free-roaming horses have lived and died on the 60-odd miles of North Carolina islands that now constitute Cape Lookout National Seashore since the time of Spanish and English colonists arriving in the area. Now they remain only on 3,000-acre Shackleford Banks.



Cape Lookout itself is also a favorite place to visit, with the calm backwaters of the sound on one side, and the raging fury of the Atlantic Ocean only a short distance away. The contrast is mesmerizing.

One evening we headed into the town of Beaufort to be wined and dined at one of our favorite culinary sites, Moonraker's. Having close to two dozen people show up all at once put a bit of stress on the local staff, but they did a great job of getting us settled and well fed. Always a delightful experience.

With the Bimmer teams scurrying around the islands, we used a variety of tools for staying in touch and directing our collective plans for reconvening. As an example, our update on Saturday night was a perfect

example of the camaraderie and fun we had as a group.

Tar Heel & Toe High Performance Driving School, April 19-20, 2025 VIR – Full Course

I have been fond of (addicted to ?) fast car for a long time and have previously participated in 28 HPDS at VIR, At VIR I have driven 12 different cars including 3 Audis, 3 BMWs and 5 Corvettes. This event was the first time for my 2024 BMW M3 Competition xDrive (bone stock). VIR with its combination of long and short straights, elevation changes, and left and right corners of varying tightness is regarded as one of the top 5 tracks in America. I appreciate the corporate sponsors (Tuttle Motorsports, HMS Motorsports, Korman, Bimmerworld, Quantum Speed Works, EuroEnvy, Hagerty, Bimmer Performance Center, German Motors, and Vac Motorsports) that made the event more affordable for more enthusiasts. Thankfully, we had a dry weekend. Ambient temperatures ranged from low 60s upon arrival to near 80 on both days.



In my last HPDE school, I drove a 2023 C8 Corvette Z51. The Corvette with its mid-engine 6.2 L V-8 (495 hp) paired with an 8-speed automatic was quite fast (0-60 mph in 2.8-2.9 seconds). The M3 is obviously heavier (3929 lbs) than the Corvette but also has more power (503 hp @ 6250 rpm per BMW; BMW online forums say about 528 hp). BMW quotes a 0-60 mph time of 3.4 seconds; however, Car & Driver say they were able to do the trick in 2.8 seconds, so the car is basically as fast as the Corvette. The AWD running

through a shiftable 8-speed automatic gives the M3 an advantage adding throttle exiting corners.




As in any HPDE school, passing is always by "invitation" from the car being passed. BMW uses hand signals out the driver's open window to point by on the left or right side depending upon the place on track. In addition to the 3 basic and longer passing zones (6a to 7 - bridge straight, 12 to 13 - back straight, and 17a to 1 front straight), passing was also allowed in 5 shorter straights for the B Group and higher The car or cars doing the passing will go off-line, and the car being passed should attenuate its acceleration to enable a safe pass before the next turn. Most drivers seemed to be cooperating; however, there was an occasion where I gave 2 cars permission to pass and 2 more cars blew by before the left turn entering the climbing esses (Turn 7). This unsafe practice was firmly addressed in the all drivers meeting Sunday morning. BMW CCA is very safety conscious.

On Saturday I ran in Group B (Advanced Intermediate) and although I passed a few cars, I gave way more passing invitations than I took. The 3.27-mile course has 21 turns numbered 1 to 17 with 4 of them having 2 numbers such as 5 and 5a, etc. Although I could maintain some acceleration when being passed by a fast car, I had to just maintain speed to let less powerful cars get by safely. The downside of this courtesy was that cars further back would then close in and also need to pass creating a vicious cycle negatively affecting my pace and consistency. On Sunday I was transferred to the C Group (Lower Advanced). My instructor said that I had demonstrated the correct handling of every turn on

the track. However, he also said I had not executed this correct handling on every turn consistently. I think my inconsistency was largely because of giving so many passes. My self-diagnosis is that my biggest problem was not consistently using threshold braking thereby allowing slower cars to catch up. So, after 18 HPDS at VIR, I am still learning and still having fun. The M3 wants to go again. My records for fuel milage indicated about 28 mpg to/from VIR and 8.3-8.5 mpg on track.

Flamingo Road

Spring is now running at full throttle in Central North Carolina, which made April 12 the perfect day to get out into the countryside to carve some apexes with Bimmers looking forward to their getting oil stirred. Vigorously. We managed to time this event perfectly too, since early spring in The Old North State is punctuated by a fine green haze which is injected into the air by the pine trees that grace the place as they get down to the serious business of enjoying the growing season. The haze, which is large format pollen, can waft across roads much like the snow drifts enjoyed in other locales. It isn't slippery, but it sure does get into everything! Pretty much what you'd expect to happen if you put a bar of Irish Spring soap into a food processor without a lid and hit puree. By today, helped along by recent rains, the air was clear.

And, although the sky was a steely gray that seemed to threaten precipitation, none ever came. That made the day even better since it was perfect for some serious nature photography.



Before we got to that, however, we had to meet up at the Farmhouse Café in Wendell for a great round of coffee and breakfast snacks. Then, promptly at 9am, we spun the Roundels into action to begin the journey to Scotland Neck, home of the Sylvan Heights Bird Sanctuary. By the time we were assembled, there were 15 BMW's and 30 willing participants.

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Meeting us at the venue were six more people in four additional Bimmers, which brought the final count to 19 cars and 36 hungry participants. We only undershot our estimate for the restaurant by 50%, but more on that later.

The drive took us east on the Interstate toward the town of Nashville, then exited us into some stunningly pretty farm country which graces this part of the world. Lovely ribbons of black asphalt with almost no discernable traffic bisecting acres of fields that are also waking up to the next opportunity to support the local agricultural plans. In this area the cash crops include wheat, peanuts, cotton, beans, and corn. The only obvious fields at the moment are the wheat, which are rocketing skyward now in the warm sun and lengthening days. The Bimmer stream threaded beautifully through the scene, no doubt entertaining the locals as we temporarily slowed our progress to scoot through some towns, then back to cruising speed as quickly as possible on the other side, without bothering the local constabulary.

Finally, we arrived in the small town of Scotland Neck, population 2,059 according to Wikipedia. The town was first settled in 1722 by a colony of Scots Highlanders led by Lord Nairn. The name Scotland Neck first described the small communities that clustered around this original settlement. According to the UNC archives, Scotland Neck is the only town in North Carolina with parking in the middle of Main Street which we immediately stumbled on. Curious, indeed.

Finally, we found the bird sanctuary on the north side of town. The staff were waiting for us, offering an overview of the property and the chance to see a movie describing the facilities, before we headed out to scope out the aviaries. It was, in a word, brilliant. More than 300 species of bird grace the facility, from small and perky parakeets ... to gigantic and majestic African Eagles. In keeping with their personality profiles, the former swooped around us, landed on our heads, and ate food out of our hands. The latter sat sternly on their perches, wing to wing, keeping track of their kingdom. Not much question about their ability to dispatch corrective action in a hurry if circumstances should warrant it!



After several hours exploring the sanctuary and feeding the residents, it was time for us to head our own lunch event. In such a small town, we weren't necessarily expecting a top shelf experience. We were clearly wrong, however. For reasons no one could explain, there is a fine dining Italian restaurant on the Main Street in the area where one parks in the middle of the street. The sight of all those Bimmers arrayed in a row was majestic, to be sure. Inside the La Casetta, the environment was warm and inviting. They made their "event space" available to us, which allowed us to get all 36 of us into a single spot. The din from old friends, and new ones, sharing stories of adventures and experiences was delightful. The food was simply amazing. The service was excellent, despite our inability to provide a good estimate of participants!



All too soon, it was time to point the Roundels toward home. With no time pressure, we were able to cruise all the way back to the "barn" on delightful back roads which invited periodic use of the loud pedal. The mighty B58 under the bonnet of the X3M40 made quick work of the trip, which was itself delicious. The perfect end to a wonderful day. A great way for the dining club with the driving problem to experience a weekend date. Many more adventures to come!

On this day, the Food Bank organized a bit of a competition with invitations going out to both the local BMW and Mercedes-Benz chapters, with the idea being we would see who could prepare more food to be shipped out to the needy members of communities across the eastern and central counties of the Old North State. The food we packed would be in distribution centers in 48 hours, helping address a significant challenge around "food security" that is a very real reality today.



The final count of car club participants was 21, with 16 representing the Roundel and the balance the Silver Star. It was all in good fun with the Merc folks

sharing their donuts with the BMW crowd, and we shared German car stories in return for our meal.

For today's adventure, we were packing sweet potatoes into 10-pound bags which make for easy use when they get to the homes across 34 of NC's counties. Our job was to sort out any defective spuds so that they could become recycled as compost, and the good ones sent for delivery. The work was a bit tedious, but we had great fun improving our workflows and finding ways to accelerate the broader effort. It was all a rousing success, with our combined efforts for everyone on the morning shift producing 20,000 pounds of the orange tuberous roots to ship. That translates to roughly 17k meals. Good work for a morning effort! The BMW crew accounted for some 3,800 pounds of the total, with the Merc team adding another 1,200. As much fun as it all was, there was also a somber element to the effort. The annual budget for the Food Bank in this part of the world is \$27m. Of that, \$6m was recently cut by the Federal Government. This money was used to pay local farmers to supply food to the bank. Without these funds, it has created real uncertainty for both the farmers and the people in need of food supplies.

After packaging the food, we had a chance to head over to a local microbrewery where they had conveniently arranged a Mexican themed food truck. After a full morning of work, the chance to enjoy a cold brew and some great chow. Not a sweet potato in sight of course, but the tacos, burritos, and other offerings were simply fantastic.

Our work completed, it was time to fire up the Bimmers and head for home. At least on this part of the adventure we really did have a chance to carve a few apexes. Many thanks to all for a job well done! Even better is the news that Kellie is already working on our next chance to contribute time to the Food Bank in Q3-25. The dining club with a driving problem has a good heart too ...

Grabber Blau ist Wunderbar

After a Friday night that was punctuated by thunderstorms and epic amounts of rain, miraculously, May 3rd dawned as a warm and sunny affair in Central North Carolina. After almost a year of planning, the one thing we couldn't control was the weather, but Mother Nature chose to smile upon us as we set up for our second annual Vintage Bimmer and Beemer event in Raleigh.

By 7:30am the pit crew was onsite at the <u>Bimmer Performance Center</u>, opening the shop and getting our gear set up. Dan Connor, owner of the BPC, has been a huge supporter of the BMWCCA over the years, and was gracious in supporting us having a joint event at the shop. It turns out that this was the last big event to be held at the old shop; by July they will be in new digs which are stunning. No confusion that the new place is anything other than a home for BMW's. The architect managed to incorporate a <u>Hofmeister kink</u> into the design which is stunning.



The shop was set up ahead of the event to feature a series of racing machines built by Dan and his ablebodied team. This included an E30 that has seen the engine bay filled with a 4.4-liter BMW V8, an E46

spec racer, and other beautiful Bimmers that were all ready to do battle on the twists and curves of our favorite local track, Virginia International Raceway.

Of course, a surprising number of the Bimmer faithful are fans of Beemers as well, and as if to demonstrate the theme commitment, one of the BMW Airheads club members had put their R100S on show, which also featured the shop's standard motif of Grabber Blue.

Why is this Dan's favorite color? It turns out that his father had a Mustang Mach 1 429CJ in this shade when he himself was ushered into this world and keeping the color alive is both close to what is on the state flag from Bavaria, and a link to his father. There's also something about this event which links to my dad, which I really appreciate. My connection to Bimmers happened when he brought home a lovely 2002 in 1971. Four years later, our first Beemer, an R90/6 made an appearance, and my own interest in gear wearing the roundel from Munich was cemented.

We arranged the day to allow for a co-mingling of the two and four-wheeled faithful when appropriate, but also to have separate tracks to run on where we could share information and insights specific to their favorite rides. Thanks to the efforts of the assembled team, the choreography came off brilliantly. A good thing too since we had 105 people register to take part throughout the day.

One of the shared experiences was a German food truck which was appropriately named Harmon's Deutsche Kuchen. They were exceptional, delivering such delights as schnitzel and bratwurst and other culinary wonders from Deutschland. The biggest challenge turned out to be how to get over to the truck and not miss the other things that were happening on the property.

The local contingent of M-car owners was sharing experiences around things like a Z4M Coupe, some fantastic M5's, and a selection of M3's from across the generations. E46's are always a personal favorite, but the V8 powered E92's are fearsome to listen to. An event like this wouldn't be complete of course without an F87 M2 and a lovely example in Long Beach blue made an appearance. So many blues, so little time, it seemed.



Meanwhile, the Airheads group had appeared with their signature tent and sofas, allowing for the Beemer faithful to relax in an appropriate form of repose, with cool beverages and hot coffee making the best lubrication of all for detailed discussions on BMW's that left the factory in (West) Berlin as many as 55 years ago. The 1970 R75/5 was an amazing machine when it arrived to dramatically change the view of BMW's as stodgy machines that were reliable and reliably slow. Much like the 2002's of that same era, the old quote from David E. Davis applied here as well ... these were machines where the top speeds doubled as their cruising speeds. They could roll along flat out until the petrol tank ran dry.

As we moved from coffee and donuts, the first tech session was hosted by Dan Connor focused on

Bimmers. Great discussion on the work the shop does to support local racing efforts, the pivot they have made over the years to do more work on current Bimmers, and the effort they put forward to make sure they can support the vintage community. That includes everything from 1602/2002 machines, E21's, E30's, E34's ... pretty much an alphabet soup of the machines that have come from Bavaria over the years. In fact, they recently had someone bring a 1957 Isetta for some work. This led to a great discussion about how BMW built a series of cars in that era which clearly had four wheels but used the same air-cooled engines that graced Beemers. For a company whose survival was in question in the late 50's, every bit of extra revenue and margin was critical.



Dan fielded an array of questions on proper maintenance for Bimmers, including the crucial notion of changing oil in modern machines more frequently than the owner's manual might suggest. The combination of higher operating temperatures and greater internal pressures, with engines that have ever tighter tolerances, making the oil an absolutely critical maintenance element for longevity. I know that we follow this advice carefully, changing the engine lubricant every 5k miles on our 2023 X3M40.

Next up we flipped into a terrific presentation from Mike McChargue on the proper care and maintenance for the finishes of Bimmers and Beemers alike. Paint is something that, without proper care, will naturally deteriorate from all the elements that Mother Nature throws at it. The cleaning and "feeding" of the paint is crucial to keeping the BMW's looking their best, irrespective of paint generation. Mike demonstrated the tools he uses but also shared insights on the various potions he has landed on as being best for both the exterior and the interior. Of course, on Beemers, there's no such thing as an "interior" per se, but the tools of the craft remain the same. Mike showcased our R100RS, which has plenty of patina after 46 years on the road, as something where his talent has yielded amazing results. The proof is in the pictures.



After a break for some more schnitzel, we swung over to the Beemer world. Tony Bohannon and Ted Holtaway led a spirited discussion on all things airhead. While BMW's auto division was on solid footing by the end of the 1960's, the same was not true for the motorbikes. The company made a significant investment to start the new decade, and the West German government gave them a substantial tax incentive to build a new factory in West Berlin.

When these airheads hit the market, they were enough to save the division for another day. By 1974, the first of the <u>Hans Muth</u> designed machines had hit the market and catapulted BMW to a healthy position as a company. His machines, heavily modified for racing, went on to win the 1976 AMA Superbike Series, and the divisions future was secured.

The discussion again focused on an array of maintenance items, including the criticality of staying on top of steering head bearings, focusing on proper routine maintenance, and grappling with the anomalies of equipment that has been on the road for half a century. Both of our guest speakers focused on the value of doing maintenance work both right, and completely, and as Tony noted ... "we are using them now, but also caretaking them for another generation to use". What a great perspective on vintage BMW's, irrespective of how many wheels they are turning at any given moment in time.

The day was one that was in the making for almost a year. Once it arrived, it flew past faster than an M1 or R90S at full chat on the back straight at Nürburgring. It was a great experience for all who had a chance to be there, and we're already looking forward to a three-peat in 2026. We hope to have plenty of Beemers and Bimmers, and absolutely no Bummers, on hand. Oddly enough, the ride to the shop on my trusty RS was a cool 30 miles. The ride home was three times that long. The ultimate driving and riding machines are just that. They were built to be used and will happily do so for as long as we are willing to properly care for them. Which was the point of the event in the first place!
